Articulation Suggestions

The articulation of the horn part in the Tritsch-Tratsch Polka is relatively straightforward. Most of the notes are played with a tongued articulation, but there are a few slurred passages. The following are some articulation suggestions:

* Tongue all of the eighth notes in the opening measures. * Slur the quarter notes in measures 5-8. * Tongue the sixteenth notes in measures 9-12. * Slur the quarter notes in measures 13-16. * Tongue the eighth notes in measures 17-20. * Slur the quarter notes in measures 21-24. * Tongue the eighth notes in measures 25-28. * Slur the quarter notes in measures 29-32.

Musical Expression

The Tritsch-Tratsch Polka is a lively and energetic piece, so it is important to play it with a sense of rhythm and swing. The following are some tips on how to play the part in a musically expressive way:

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
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
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
