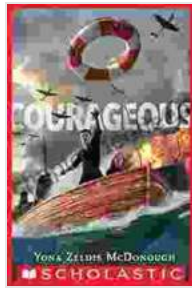


Courageous Sigmund Brouwer: A True Hero of the Sea

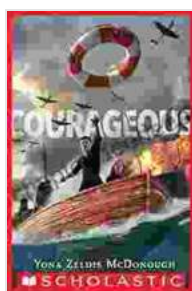

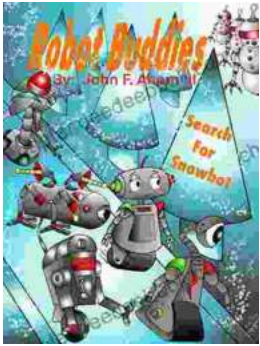

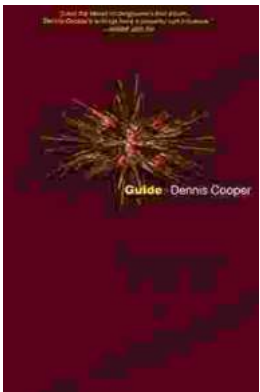
