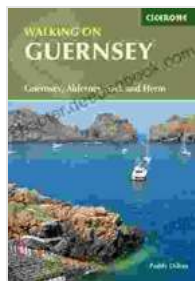


Guernsey, Alderney, Sark, and Herm: A British Walking Guide to the Channel Islands

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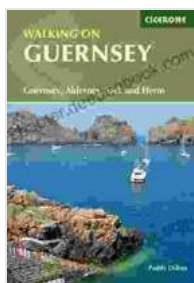

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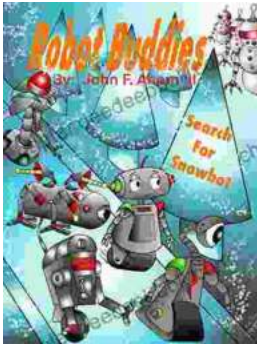
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
